
We are always seeking deputy officers. If you can attend one of our meetings at the library, please think about talking to one of our current officers. They're also just an email away.

Tasty Tipples

Lady Athelyna de Oldenfeld

Good gentlefolk, pray allow me to introduce myself and this note. I am Lady Athelyna de Oldenfeld, who is among other things, both a fourteenth century lady and an appreciator of spirited drinks, who most earnestly (and armed with some small knowledge, a great lack of skill, and a yet greater measure of enthusiasm), endeavours to encourage the creation of the same. I begin this missive as a way to set forth the means and knowledge to assist all interested folk to join me in this endeavor, for as we know, the more the merrier!

A few inquiries on spirits and meads:

How do spirits arise in drinkable liquids? By the workings of yeest, called by the old norse "jostr," which lately is discovered to be in truth a collection of tiny animals. It foameth during the working, which is called barm, and may be gathered and cast into thy barrel from the batch preceding; also, a bit wrapped in a tiny packet may be had from a merchant. It is said that leaving thy vessel open to the fresh air may cause it to begin working without any added yeest, but be advised that it may also cause the contents of this vessel to grow foul and unclean.

What is the nature of this spirit? It releaseth the essence of fruits, vegetables, and spices; is less heavy than water; increaseth the companionable inter-actions of friends, fire and the bardic arts; is also fiery on the tongue when new; and is most agreeable to moderate consumption, though may be vengeful in action when taken to excess.

What is needful for the actions of the barm to cause such wholesome spirits to arise? Excellent cleanliness in all regards, fresh air, fair water, a goodly amount of something sweet, and either a bit of barm cast in, or open-ness to fresh air. Any lack in these may be clearly noticed in the resulting drink. When the yeest have eaten, they do release both vapors and liquids, which are the origin of the spirits.

What water is best? That which cometh from the clouds is best.¹ Spring water or water boiled and set overnight in a closed vessel are also good.

What varieties of sweet may be used? Any good and clean sweet. Admirable potations can be made from loaf sugar, properly treated grains, grapes, nearly any fruit you may have, even some vegetables, and queen of them all: fine honey.

What is a mead or meth or meodu? It is a drink of good honey and faire water, well worked by the action of the yeest. No other ingredients are required, though they are permitted.

What are the qualities of good honey? Good honey is, "cleere, odoriferous, yelow like gold... and sharpe, sweet, & pleasant to the tast, of a meane co(n)sistence betweene thicke & thin, so clammy that beeing taken up upon your fingers ende, in falling it wil not part but hang downe togither like a long string, as that useth to do which is clarified. And such doth Iacobus Sylvius describe the best hony to be."²

Why are some drinks more formidable in spirituous action than others? This may be accidental or by design. Firstly, the greater the part of the mixture that is sweet, the stronger thy drink may become. Secondly, the nature of thy barm will govern how strong it may become. In a mixture for mead, the barm of a common ale yieldeth a moderate drink.

How should one proceed, to make a fair mead?

In a word, hygiene is the reigning principle. For the remainder, pray read my next missive. In the mean-time, cleanse thy home and person well, and gather up these materials:

A quantity of clean honey, faire water, and a bit of ale or wine barm. Spices and suchlike may be added as befits thy taste and purse. Gather also a very large spoon with a long handle, a number of clean cloths, a vessel to stand upon the fire, a vessel to receive the frothings, and a tun for the workings. If thy working-tun be open-topped, as a bucket, it should have also a lid with a bunghole which may be loosely stopped with a clean cloth. If it is of good glass, such as is called a "carboy", thou shouldst also have a funnel, an airlock, and a wineglassful of "spirits of wine", which can be had from the monks (or a merchant, if you know no monks).

A short history of Iona, Scotland

I have to admit that I might not have found the island of Iona, Scotland, if it weren't for a good friend who had wanted to visit it. She wished to pay her respects to the several Scottish, Irish and Viking royalty that are buried there.

Iona is a bit off the beaten track, compared to the mainland of Scotland. Iona is a tiny island, only about one mile across (East to West) and about three miles top to bottom. It's located in a group of western Scottish islands, known as the Hebrides. Today's traveler typically leaves the mainland, in Oban (a lovely Western Scottish town, with a fantastic distillery). Travel is by ferry, to the Isle of Mull, a rather large Scottish island.

Travel to the western shore by bus takes perhaps an hour or more. I would believe that most medieval travelers would probably have kept to the coastal waterways instead. Once on the far side of Mull, present day travelers find another, small ferry. The isle is most notable by the fact that in 563, Saint Columba, exiled from his native Ireland, founded a monastery on Iona. He's most well known for his work in converting pagan Scotland and much of northern England to Christianity. In time, Iona became a well known place of learning and was a favored site of Christian pilgrimage. All this on an island that is only 3 square miles in size! Eventually, as its reputation grew, it also became a holy island where several Scottish, Irish and Viking kings/ queens came to be buried.

Many believe that the Book of Kells was created on Iona in the late 8th century. This was thought to be to commemorate the 200th year of Saint Columba's death in 597.

However, this was still a turbulent time and there were several raids from Vikings over several decades. With so many relics being plundered, the monastery was abandoned in 849.

Later in 1203, a Benedictine abbey was built on the same spot as the earlier monastery. In 1208, Beathag, the daughter of Somerled, was the first prioress of a convent for Benedictine nuns. By the mid 1500's, the Reformation left most of the monastery demolished and all but three of the 360 carved crosses were destroyed.

Today, the monastery has been rebuilt and restored again, albeit with later period materials. It still felt quite ancient to me, with its heavily carved Celtic crosses (sad to say, most were reproductions). I highly recommend the small museum in the back of the church. There you will find several well worn headstones of medieval Kings and Queens.

The nunnery however was never restored, though a good portion of it remains today. The present day traveler will find a beautiful garden at the ruined nunnery site. I found it to be a wonderful place to hide from the stiff Atlantic wind. There is an air of ancient stillness; I highly recommend traveling there, especially if in the summer months.
